A **statement** of no more than 150 words is required to be submitted to the Editor-in-Chief, describing how knowledge gained through the Congress will be disseminated to your local colleagues. It is also expected that the winner will prepare a manuscript for consideration of publication in *Intensive and Critical Care Nursing* as a result of their presentation and this should be briefly detailed in the application also (included in the 150 words). Assistance will be available from the Editorial team for novice writers.

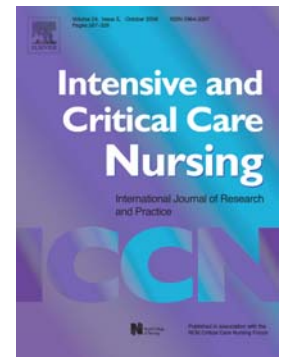
